Number of people counted

Total population

- 43,653 people usually live in Gisborne District. This is a decrease of 807 people, or 1.8 percent, since the 2006 Census.
- Its population ranks 26th in size out of the 67 districts in New Zealand.
- Gisborne District has 1.0 percent of New Zealand's population.

Māori population

- 19,683 Māori usually live in Gisborne District. This is a decrease of 75 people, or less than one percent, since the 2006 Census.
- Its Māori population ranks 6th in size out of the 67 districts in New Zealand.
- 3.3 percent of New Zealand's Māori population usually live in Gisborne District.

Number of dwellings counted

- There are 16,185 occupied dwellings and 1,824 unoccupied dwellings in Gisborne District.
- For New Zealand as a whole, there are 1,570,695 occupied dwellings and 185,448 unoccupied dwellings.
- There are 54 dwellings under construction in Gisborne District, and 9,756 under construction in New Zealand.


Age and sex

Total population

- The median age (half are younger, and half older, than this age) is 37.0 years for people in Gisborne District. For New Zealand as a whole, the median age is 38.0 years.
- 14.0 percent of people in Gisborne District are aged 65 years and over, compared with 14.3 percent of the total New Zealand population.
- 24.6 percent of people are aged under 15 years in Gisborne District, compared with 20.4 percent for all of New Zealand.

Age and sex of people





Māori population

- The median age of Māori (half are younger, and half older, than this age) is 26.2 years in Gisborne District, compared with a median of 23.9 years for all Māori in New Zealand.
- 7.3 percent of Māori in Gisborne District are aged 65 years and over, compared with 5.4 percent of New Zealand's Māori population.
- 32.7 percent of Māori are aged under 15 years in Gisborne District, compared with 33.8 percent for all Māori in New Zealand.

Age and sex of Māori



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Cultural diversity

Ethnic groups

- 60.8 percent of people in Gisborne District belong to the European ethnic group, compared with 74.0 percent for New Zealand as a whole.
- 48.9 percent of people in Gisborne District belong to the Māori ethnic group, compared with 14.9 percent for all of New Zealand.

Birthplace

Total population

- 9.7 percent of people in Gisborne District were born overseas, compared with 25.2 percent for New Zealand as a whole.
- For people born overseas who are now living in Gisborne District, the most common birthplace was England, and England is the most common overseas birthplace for all of New Zealand.

Māori population

- 1.4 percent of Māori in Gisborne District were born overseas, compared with 1.8 percent for New Zealand as a whole.

Languages spoken

Total population

- After English, the next most common language spoken in Gisborne District is te reo Māori, which is spoken by 15.6 percent of people. For New Zealand as a whole, the most common language apart from English is te reo Māori, spoken by 3.7 percent of people.
- New Zealand Sign Language is used by less than one percent of people in Gisborne District, compared with less than one percent of people for all of New Zealand.
- 79.5 percent of people in Gisborne District speak only one language, compared with 79.8 percent of people for all of New Zealand.

Māori population

- After English, the next most common language spoken by Māori in Gisborne District is te reo Māori, which is spoken by 30.4 percent of Māori.
- In New Zealand, the next most common language spoken by Māori is te reo Māori, which is spoken by 21.3 percent.
- New Zealand Sign Language is used by less than one percent of Māori in Gisborne District compared with less than one percent of Māori for all of New Zealand.
- 69.1 percent of Māori in Gisborne District speak only one language, compared with 76.5 percent of all Māori in New Zealand.

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
Relationship status

Total population aged 15 years and over

- 38.3 percent of people aged 15 years and over living in Gisborne District have never married, 42.5 percent are married, and 19.3 percent are separated, divorced or widowed.
- 30.7 percent of people aged 15 years and over in Gisborne District who have never been married, live with a partner.




Māori population aged 15 years and over

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
Qualifications

Total population aged 15 years and over

- 71.7 percent of people aged 15 years and over in Gisborne District have a formal qualification, compared with 79.1 percent of people in New Zealand.
- In Gisborne District, 12.7 percent of people aged 15 years and over held a bachelor's degree or higher as their highest qualification, compared with 20.0 percent for New Zealand as a whole.




Māori population aged 15 years and over

- In Gisborne District, 64.5 percent of Māori aged 15 years and over have a formal qualification, compared with 66.7 percent for Māori in New Zealand.
- 9.1 percent of Māori aged 15 years and over in Gisborne District held a bachelor's degree or higher as their highest qualification, compared with 10.0 percent of New Zealand's Māori population.

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
Work

Total population aged 15 years and over

- The unemployment rate in Gisborne District is 9.3 percent for people aged 15 years and over, compared with 7.1 percent for all of New Zealand.
- The most common occupational group in Gisborne District is 'labourers', and 'professionals' is the most common occupational group in New Zealand.


Māori population aged 15 years and over

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Income


Total population aged 15 years and over

- For people aged 15 years and over, the median income (half earn more, and half earn less, than this amount), in Gisborne District is \$24,400. This compares with a median of \$28,500 for all of New Zealand.
- 41.9 percent of people aged 15 years and over in Gisborne District have an annual income of \$20,000 or less, compared with 38.2 percent of people for New Zealand as a whole.
- In Gisborne District, 19.6 percent of people aged 15 years and over have an annual income of more than \$50,000, compared with 26.7 percent of people in New Zealand.



Māori population aged 15 years and over

- For Māori aged 15 years and over, the median income (half earn more, and half less than this amount) in Gisborne District is \$19,900, compared with a median of \$22,500 for all Māori in New Zealand.
- In Gisborne District, 50.3 percent of Māori aged 15 years and over have an annual income of \$20,000 or less, compared with 46.3 percent of Māori in New Zealand.
- 13.4 percent of Māori aged 15 years and over in Gisborne District have an annual income of more than \$50,000, compared with 18.1 percent of all Māori in New Zealand.

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
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Families

Family type

- Couples with children make up 37.2 percent of all families in Gisborne District, while couples without children make up 35.0 percent of all families.
- In New Zealand, couples with children make up 41.3 percent of all families, while couples without children make up 40.9 percent of all families.
- 27.8 percent of families in Gisborne District are one parent with children families, while one parent with children families make up 17.8 percent of families for New Zealand as a whole.



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Households

Household composition

- One-family households make up 66.8 percent of all households in Gisborne District. For New Zealand as a whole, one-family households make up 68.3 percent of all households.
- In Gisborne District, there are 4,035 one-person households making up 26.2 percent of all households. In New Zealand, one-person households make up 23.5 percent of all households.
- The average household size in Gisborne District is 2.7 people, compared with an average of 2.7 people for all of New Zealand.

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Phone, fax, and Internet


Access to phones, fax machines, and Internet

- 63.2 percent of households in Gisborne District have access to the Internet, compared with 76.8 percent of households in New Zealand.
- In Gisborne District, 77.5 percent of households have access to a cellphone, compared with 83.7 percent of households for New Zealand as a whole.


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Transport

Access to motor vehicles

- 12.3 percent of households in Gisborne District have access to three or more motor vehicles, compared with 16.1 percent of all households in New Zealand.

Main means of travel to work

- The most common means of travel to work on census day for people in Gisborne District was driving a private car, truck or van (63.8 percent of people who travelled to work used this form of transport).
- This was followed by driving a company car, truck or van (16.0 percent) and passenger in a car, truck, van or company bus (7.1 percent).
- For New Zealand as a whole, the most common means of travel to work was driving a private car, truck or van, followed by driving a company car, truck or van, and walking or jogging.


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Housing

Home ownership

- In Gisborne District, 59.2 percent of households in occupied private dwellings owned the dwelling or held it in a family trust.
- For New Zealand as a whole, 64.8 percent of households in occupied private dwellings owned the dwelling or held it in a family trust.
- For households in Gisborne District who rented the dwelling that they lived in, the median weekly rent paid was \$200. This compared with \$280 for New Zealand as a whole.

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Building consents

Building consent data for the year ended December 2013 showed that:

- The total number of building consents issued for dwellings, including apartments, in Gisborne District was 92.
- The total number of building consents issued for apartments in Gisborne District was 0.
- The total value of residential building work in Gisborne District was \$37,907,860.
- The total value of non-residential building work in Gisborne District was \$30,181,290.

Note: Building consent data is obtained from all accredited building consent authorities (ie territorial authorities) and is compiled if the building consent issued is valued over \$5000. See data quality information on building consents.

Business

Business demographics

Business demographic data for the year ended February 2013 showed that:

- There were 4,878 business locations (geographic units) in Gisborne District compared with 507,908 for all of New Zealand. This is a decrease of less than one percent from the year ended February 2006 for Gisborne District.
- There were 19,960 paid employees in Gisborne District compared with 1,941,040 for all New Zealand. This is a decrease of 5.0 percent from the year ended February 2006 for Gisborne District.
